from the President's desk... **CHARLES HESS**

Thank you very much for the great response from members renewing their membership and special thanks to the emeriti who have joined the Association for the first time or renewed their membership after a year or two lapse. Last March we had a record high of 251 members of whom 134 are life members. If all of last year's members renew their membership, we will set a new record. You will find a list of members in this issue of EmeriTimes. Please let Kimberly Pulliam in the Academic Senate Office know if there are any errors.

In this issue you will find an update to the Retiree Parking Permit issue. The results of the Retiree Parking Survey are enclosed as well as actions taken by your Association, the Academic Senate Emeriti Committee, and the Senate Committee on Parking and Transportation. It is expected that a decision about continuing to provide free RT Permits to emeriti and retirees will be made in early November.

I will be meeting this month with John Yates, Special Projects Director, Office of Resource Management and Planning, to discuss that status of the Hotel/Conference Center as a possible home for the proposed Retirees Center and space that may serve as a venue for meetings. The combination of the legal actions attempting to block the development of the Hotel/Conference Center and the budget cuts have slowed progress in the establishment of the Retirees Center to serve the UCDEA and UCRA.

Now that the legal activities have hopefully run their course and there is a clearer picture of the budget situation, planning can resume. We will have more information in the next issue of EmeriTimes.

Faculty and staff are currently receiving new photo-ID cards similar to the student registration cards. A committee has been established by Eben Sutton, associate accounting officer, to develop a similar card for emeriti and retirees to replace the current pink annuitant card. You will find a brief report about the committee and the photo ID card in this issue.

UC Davis hosted the joint meeting of the Council of UC Emeriti Associations (CUCEA) and the Council of UC Retirees Associations (CUCRA) on October 7th. Highlights of the meeting are included as well as the 2004-2005 officers of CUCEA.

I want to call your attention to two forms that we request you complete and return in the enclosed envelope. One relates to the luncheon and general meetings of the UCDEA and if you would like to be sent a monthly reminder. If you do, can we send the card by email. The second form is for membership in the event that you are not a member or have not renewed your membership and misplaced the form that we sent to you in September.

RETIREE PARKING PERMITS

At a June 3rd meeting of the Academic Senate Emeriti Committee, chaired by Alex McCalla, Stan Nosek, Vice Chancellor of Administration, shared the results of the Retiree Parking Survey that was mailed to retirees during the RT permit renewal period in December 2003. Transportation and Parking Services (TAPS) conducted the survey. 1567 surveys and renewal packets were sent to retirees. 1391 retirees renewed their RT permits by January 31, 2004 and 1116 provided survey responses for a response rate of 85%.

Responders were also invited to submit written comments and/or suggestions. There were 76 written comments which ranged from an expression of appreciation for having RT permits, the importance of the permit in their continuing participation in the campus community, and numerous comments about the negative impact discontinuance of the RT Permit program would have on their ability and willingness to serve the campus and participate in its activities.

In addition to the written survey, TAPS conducted a one-day count of how many RT permits were on campus. On the day of the count in late February, there were 35 RT permit holders on campus.

Your President wrote to Chancellor Vanderhoef last June to make the case that the survey and one-day count support the position taken by the Emeriti Associate last year that the financial impact of the free RT permits upon campus parking is relatively small. The survey shows that 80% of the RT permits are used 4 days or less per month and 80% stay on campus 3 hours or less. The one-day count made in February showed that there were only 35 RT permits on campus and thus the "real cost" of the RT permit is small. Based on the written comments, the loss of good will would far outweigh the income generated by a RT permit fee.

Alex McCalla wrote to Vice Chancellor Nosek, on behalf of the Academic Senate Emeriti Committee, the following:

"It is also clear that many emeriti find parking privileges a positive incentive for continuing to participate in Campus activities. Finally, it should be noted that many retirees, including those who took VERIP, view free parking as an entitlement. It is seen by all as one of the benefits of emeritus status at Davis. The Emeriti committee therefore views this as a very important program that should be continued as a small token of appreciation for their continued support of the campus. It seems a small price to pay to keep 1200 retirees happy.

At the same time, the Emeriti Committee agrees that the funding of the program should not be a tax on current parkers. Thus while we express our strong support for continuing the policy of not charging a parking fee for emeriti faculty members, we do agree with you that an alternative source of revenue should be found to fund the small cost."

Judy Stern, chair of the Academic Senate Committee on Parking and Transportation also wrote a memo in June to Chancellor Vanderhoef, Provost Hinshaw, and Vice Chancellor Nosek and included the following statement about the RT Permit for emeriti:

"Similarly, we are recommending that the TAPS budget not pay for emeriti parking. We acknowledge the important contributions that emeriti make to our campus community including teaching, advising students, research, and serving on

committees. Furthermore, they are potential donors. However, these benefits accrue to the campus as a whole not just to individual parkers. Therefore, we are recommending that parking fees for emeriti be paid for [from] out of development funds."

As of now the Emeriti Association, the Academic Senate Emeriti Committee, and the Academic Senate Committee on Parking and Transportation all have urged that the campus administration maintain the policy of providing free RT permits. The Senate Emeriti Committee feels that the cost of free RT permits, albeit relatively small, should not be absorbed by the faculty and staff who pay for parking permits. The Senate Committee on Parking and Transportation agrees and further suggests that development funds be used to cover the cost of the RT Permits. There is information that emeriti and retirees have contributed nearly \$28 million to the campus. Vice Chancellor Nosek has requested TAPS to conduct another one-day count of RT Permits during the week of October 4th, the first full week of instruction, and at a couple of football games and Mondavi events. He expects that the policy for retiree parking for 2005 will be defined by early November.

UCDEA By-Law Change

At the May 27th Spring General Meeting, a by-law change was discussed and voted on. The By-law change proposed was to create a new standing committee called the Emeriti Awards Recognition Committee. This committee would be in charge of suggesting names for campus buildings and selecting the recipient for the Panunzio Award. This new standing committee would also be in charge of developing a proposal to develop in award for achievement in the sciences. Emeriti members at the meeting voted and the proposal passed unanimously.

UCDEA DUES INCREASE

At the May 27th Spring Business Meeting a dues increase was discussed and voted on by members. The proposal for an increase in UCDEA dues passed unanimously. Annual dues were raised to \$25.00 and lifetime memberships were raised to \$200.00 for 2004-2005. This will also help offset the cost of dues that are paid to the Council of University of California Emeriti Association (CUCEA).

JOINT MEETING of the COUNCIL of UC EMERITI ASSOCIATIONS (CUCEA) and the COUNCIL of UC RETIREE ASSOCIATION (CUCRA)

CUCEA and CUCRA met on the UCD Campus on October 7, 2004 in the Buehler Alumni/Visitors Center. Provost Virginia Hinshaw welcomed the council members and representatives from the Office of the President. The morning meeting was devoted to presentations by Treasurer and Vice President for Investments, David H. Russ, Associate Vice President Judy Boyette and Executive Director of Human Resources/Benefits, Michele French, and Director Joe Lewis, also of Human Resources/Benefits. In the afternoon the two Councils met separately for their business meetings and reports from each of the campus associations.

Vice President Russ provided a detailed accounting of UC managed funds. A summary of the UC Regents Portfolio Market Value Changes from 6/30/03 to 6/30/04 is shown in the following table:

Michele French reported that the monthly medical plan rates for 2005 will be unchanged for most retirees and will be lower for retirees with Medicare. This is because medical plan rates are not increasing as dramatically as they have in the past and Medicare Reform legislation passed by Congress increased the funds paid to doctors and hospitals. However, the decrease for retirees with Medicare will probably be short lived. The reason is that when Congress passed the legislation, the negotiations with health care plan providers had been completed and in effect, we paid more than was required in 2004. So the 2005 rates will reflect the savings the health care plans had for both 2004 and 2005.

There is a great deal of concern for the future of pension funds. Michele French gave examples of airlines facing bankruptcy negotiating a decrease in or an elimination of pension plans. PERS is reportedly delaying membership in their retirement system for two years. One source of the concern to UC is the ratio of people working to people retired. Forty-five percent of UC Faculty will be eligible to retire. The retired population has grown by three times since 1982. The actual and projected ratio of employees to retirees is 6:1 in 1982, 3:1 in 2002, and 2:1 in 2010. Issues being considered in Human Resources and Benefits in the Office of the President are resuming contributions to the UC Retirement Plan, rethinking Health and Benefit Plans for new employees, and ways to address the faculty/staff salary lags caused by the deficits faced by the State of California. A goal is to achieve "sustainable intergeneration equity." Director French assured the group that there are no plans to decrease the benefits currently received by retirees.

Director Joe Lewis described the new online password to provide more secure access to person HR and benefits information. A description of the change and how to establish a new password is described in the October 2004 issue of "new dimensions" the benefits newsletter for UC Retirees.

The arrangements for the meeting at UCD were made by a joint committee of the UCDEA and UCRA. Paul Stumpf chaired the committee and Ed Costanini and

Charles Hess represented the emeriti, and Barbara Nichols, Anne Gray, and Jan Stallman represented the retirees.

PHOTO ID CARDS

In January 2005, emeriti will have an opportunity to turn in their pink paper annuitant card for a plastic photo ID card similar to one that has been issued to faculty and staff this fall. The photo ID card will serve as your library card and for identification to get "affiliate rates" at the Recreational Pool and special prices from merchants that give reduced rates for UCD affiliates. The back of the card will have numbers that may be important to emeriti such as the Health Care Facilitator. The details of how and where your photo would be taken is under study by a committee under the chairmanship of Eben Sutton, Associate Accounting Officer, with Leslye Hays, Executive Officer, Chancellor/Provost's Office, Gail Nichols, Head of Library Access Services, Bob Halferty representing the Retirees and Charles Hess representing the Emeriti as members. The photo ID card program is completely voluntary. If you wish to keep your pink annuitant card and your current library card, you may do so.
